



Donations in Kind brings joy to local children at Christmas

DiK Store Manager Colleen D'Offay was offered a gift from Good360 in Sydney. 20 pallets of new Lego for the cost of freight, was she interested? Silly question.

The team quickly reached to DiK Inc member clubs – were they interested in a pallet of Lego for a local community project for the freight cost, about \$750? Within 24 hours 18 pallets were committed and Good360 was ready to send.

Clubs which took up the offer were Albury, Balwyn, Berwick, Cranbourne, Essendon, Flemington Kensington, Kew, Lilydale, Malvern, North Balwyn, Port Phillip, Preston, Warragul, Werribee, Williamstown, Wyndham Harbour.

There was great excitement at the DiK warehouse on 26 November when the truck arrived. Andy was quickly at work with the forklift and the pallets were unloaded and ready for clubs to pick up. Additionally, Rosie and Pam organised boxes of small trinkets and Christmas themed items to go with the Lego. Collections began on 28th with Frank working on the Saturday to facilitate collections.

Each pallet contained some 250 sets of Lego valued at \$12-\$100 each with donations going to Albury Tots2Teens, Bendigo Bank Seddon Christmas Appeal, Boroondara Community Outreach, Anglicare Preston and Epping, Berry Street Preston, the Bluebird Foundation, the Koala Kids Foundation,

St Matthews Church Albury, Upper Murray Family Care, Terry Floyd Foundation, CareVan, the SS&A Club for St Davids, Casey North Community Information and Support Services, Windermere Child & Family Services,

St Vincent de Paul, Vincentcare Glenroy, Flemington Community Centre, Lilydale Proactive Policing Unit and Boorndawan Willam Aboriginal Healing Service, West Welcome Wagon, The Venny, Wingate Avenue Children's Services, Vinnies Warragul, Salvation Army Warragul, Quantum Support Services, Longwarry Relief, Warragul Regional College Chaplaincy Program, and more.....

Through this initiative coordinated by DiK, 18 clubs across Victoria have donated new toys valued at \$240,000 retail to community and social service organisations supporting children in need. What a fantastic hands-on community service project having such an impact in our local communities.

Another magical toy offer came to us this year as Colleen negotiated more support for local projects through Donations in Kind.

This offer was for several pallets of new toys, mixed pallets including Lego, Star Wars, PlayDoh, PeppaPig alphabet, BeyBlades, Transformers, Nerf guns, My Little Pony, Baby Alive Dolls and more.

The toys were sorted into 24 boxes valued at \$500 and offered to clubs for \$100/\$150. They were snapped up very quickly for a range of local community projects—not available for international.

Teresa and the crew from the Ukraine Federation were hard at work again packing another container to ship to Ukraine.



She said that the aides from DIK are cleaner, in better repair and smarter than the hospital provided aides. That says loads about your quality of workmanship and standards Neil. It also speaks volumes about your commitment to providing first rate appliances without discrimination to all the allied health professionals, then further for the clients they serve.

Lukulu, in support of the Sancta Maria Nursing and Midwifery College, along with four other local clinics and hospitals located in the Western Province in Zambia.

In collaboration with the College and each hospital, Sr Pat Hanvey put together a "dream list" of what they would like to receive. Over the following three years, Rotary, Mary Ward International Australia, and key logistical contacts worked together with Sr Pat in Lukulu to make it a reality.



The container was packed at Donations in Kind in October 2024 and the shipment was carefully managed across several ports from Melbourne to Singapore then onto Dar es Salaam before the roadtrip to Lukulu.

It was welcomed at Lukulu on the evening of 19 January 2025 but became stuck in sand, requiring the local council road grader to free the truck. Then, the team, including staff and students from the College, began offloading.













The next challenge was getting the empty container off the truck. Thankfully, the town engineer was onsite and came up with a plan to use the grader to pull from the back while the truck moved forward.

The container slid off safely - though not without a little extra assistance to unlock it from the truck bed. With this, the container was successfully moved to its final location, with the help of the College tractor which pushed from behind to keep things moving smoothly despite the sand.

By the end of the day, the team had safely offloaded all the equipment, and the container was exactly where it needed to be.

This will definitely be remembered as a momentous day by the entire community. Everyone involved did an outstanding job, and delivery and unloading was a great team effort.








Jama acknowledges the tremendous support from far and wide and would like highlight the incredible work of Colleen d'Offay, Frank Dri and the DiK volunteers, without whom this project would not have achieved the success. Collaborating to support stroke victims in Sri Lanka

The Rotary Club of Flemington Kensington in District 9800 partnered with the Rotary Club of Colombo District 3220, the Australian Sri Lankan Association in Adelaide, RARE SA and Rotary Donations in Kind to deliver equipment to outfit stroke units in 9 hospitals.

Following a meeting between the Minister for Health, PDG Senake Ameresinghe and PDG Pubudu De Goysa from Rotary Colombo, Dr Harsha Gunasekara, President of the National Stroke Association, and PP Peter Cribb a detailed and extensive 'wish list' was compiled by Dr Gunasekara and his team and conveyed to Rotary Donations in Kind. As hospital beds were still in short supply following the COVID pandemic, Peter Cribb reached out to RARE who were able to assist. With assistance from former MLA Craig Ondarchie, a connection was made with the Australian Sri Lankan Association in Adelaide. Through their President Nishani, funds were collected to pay for shipping of a container from RARE in Adelaide.

ASLA members worked with the RARE team led by Manager Dave Cockshell to identify equipment and load the container. They were assisted by Dr. Charitha Perera and Dr. Mihiri Pere from the Sri Lanka Consulate of Adelaide



Meanwhile, a second container funded by Flemington Kensington Rotary was

organised through Rotary Donations in Kind, West Footscray.

This container was loaded by Flemington Kensington Rotarians and the DiK crew and shipped 2 months later.

Equipment sent in both container included 86 hospital beds and mattresses, patient monitors, blood pressure machines, transfer trolleys, examination tables, 47

wheelchairs and 24 walkers, 23 walking sticks. 16 toilet overframe seats, 6 medication trolleys, 15 cupboards, 5 tables, 24 patient chairs and 11 cartons medical supplies.

The first allocations went to the Teaching Hospital in Nagoda, in the Southern Province. Dr Harsha Gunasekara reported that the hospital staff were delighted with these items, which have already made

such a difference to patient care.

Bacau Dental Clinic, Timor Leste



18 months ago a container filled with dental and medical equipment arrived at the David Alex Dai Tula Veterans Clinic, Baucau.

Since then, there have been some challenges in installing the equipment as the original technician was unavailable. However, a Timorese technician assisted Dr Dewa and Anna the Dental Technician and now we are up and running.

On another positive, the healthy teeth programs have continued and in May 2024 we held dental promotion and screening programs within the 2 local schools.

Approximately 250 students were seen over the course of program over the year. The children are responding well and it is great to be able to run programs in the community with a focus on prevention and healthy teeth.

All supplies of toothbrushes and toothpastes from the donations received have been distributed with some to our veteran community also.



The clinic also continued to consult some of the older members of our community and mid 2024 we had ACU nursing students visit and join the clinic activities.









We were grateful for the extra manpower and expertise of the ACU students that helped us with better understanding how to use equipment that has been donated. We look forward to continuing work with Paul and the ACU team on their next visit so we can gain greater insights from which to improve both for the dental clinic and wider clinic activities that they also spent time with.

Additionally, a New Zealand group Someone Who Cares have sent a container filled with equipment and supplies which arrived just in time for the visit of the ACU students.

We value our connection with the Australian community, through which we have been able to achieve more than we could have done on our own.

We particularly value the connections between the Australian and Timorese soldiers and veteran communities. As well as the clinic providing health services to our community, it is also able to provide healing and purpose to the Australian and Timorese veterans.







Papua New Guinea—school and hospital project

The Rotary Club of Brighton together with Rotary Melbourne Passport and Star West have collaborated in an extensive and challenging project to supply educational and medical equipment to the Star Mountains area of the North Fly District of Western Province, Papua New Guinea. The area is the main service for the ok Tedi mines.



3 containers were filled with school equipment, educational supplies, shoes, sporting goods, school bags, hats, scrap books, fiction and teachers kits, playgrounds and medical equipment.

Thanks to Star West, the containers were floated, trucked and carried along the Fly River then overland for distribution.

9 schools were supplied: Finalbin Primary, Mt. Fubilan Pikinini Library & Learning centre, Tabubil Elementary School, Tabubil Primary School, Wangbin Primary School, Kwiroknai Primary School, Rumgenai Primary School, Tabubil High School and St. Gabriel Technical Secondary School.

Teresa Lachowicz the Ukraine Aid Coordinator for Australian Federation of UkrainianOrganisations (AFUO) agreed that their current shipping project would welcome theequipment but storage was at a premium and could Boronia Rotary store it until Mid March 2025.

Simba Global agreed to store the equipment, at no cost, until the items could be packed for shipment to Ukraine. The equipment was removed from the surgeries, packed for shipment, and delivered to Simba Global by Borg Dental Australia- thanks Vasko of Borg again at no cost



- Wheelchair x 1













THE MAGIC OF ROTARY

As at December 2024 Donations in Kind West Footscray has shipped 719 containers of equipment and supplies containinggoods worth \$79 million to 36 countries and administrative regions, with a strong emphasis on items that improve education, medical and maternal care. We also support disadvantaged people of the Australian community.

The countries and administrative regions we support, and the areas of activity are influenced by the passion of the Rotary clubs who raised the funds for shipping. We are also guided by Rotary International research that has identified the areas of greatest need where Rotarians can be most effective – Rotary Foundation Areas of Focus.

There are currently 30 DiK Inc members across several districts but there is always space for more.

They each pay \$3500 pa with a minimum 2 year commitment allowing them free access to the services and goods in the store for their international and local projects. This fee is used to cover the rent at the warehouse: rent and operating expenses continue to rise!.

We are also very grateful to clubs and districts who make a donation of a lesser amount. These donations help keep the store viable and pay the rent. In recent months we have received donations from Rotary Clubs of Bendigo South, Carlton, Dromana, Lakes Entrance and Traralgon. THANK YOU!

Membership of DiK Inc allows clubs to access goods in the store for their international AND local projects. Not a member, then a financial contribution will be asked from you for goods.

Colleen is available to do club visits and share the presentation with your members. This explains how Donations in Kind receives donations and then shares goods with clubs for local and international projects.
